Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is produced by the incomplete combustion of carbon-containing fuels. It is a leading cause of poisoning and death in the United States. In 2005, approximately 1,500 people died from carbon monoxide poisoning, and another 100,000 were hospitalized. The cost of carbon monoxide poisoning is estimated to be \$5 billion annually. Carbon monoxide poisoning can cause a wide range of symptoms, including headache, dizziness, weakness, and confusion. In severe cases, it can lead to coma and death. Carbon monoxide poisoning is often mistaken for the flu or other common illnesses. It is important to be aware of the signs and symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning and to take steps to prevent it.
