- GAAC discussed the draft modification of the academic appeals policy and grade appeals II. policy forwarded to us by andra Wildfeuer of SADA. It is likely that the ademic appeals policy will mostly apply to graduate students. Amanda and Holly will finthous many graduate students are affected by grade appeals in courses. GAAC had the following comments on the two motions: 1) After comparing with the BOR and UA Regulation documents, the main issue that we see is that there is no provision for the presence of an advocate for the student in either draft motion (grade appeals or academic apideals). might put these draft motions (and our existing appeals policies) out of compliance with BOR policy, which states that "A party may choose an advisor to be present at all times during the proceedings." However, both draft motions state that "The meeting will be closed to outside participation, and neither the student nor the instructor or partial artment chair may be accompanied by an advocate or representation there matters of format will be announced in advance. This was mentioned this as one of the primary drivers for updating the appeals policy, but it doesn't seem to have made it into the draft motion SUret. GAAC member who had experience with an use involving general counsel commented that it is really important that policies be followed as they are laid out; where the university can get into trouble with the law is when there is a policy specified, but it is not followed. 2) Many appeals regarding raduate students are brought through the graduate schedule requests that a representative of the graduate school be avoiding member on any appeals involving graduate students (either grade appeals or grazed academic decision appeals), so that the graduate school is aware of what is going on.
